The Cuenca Foundation is a nonprofit organization using food to fuel opportunity and provide time for education, health, and hygiene, creating longterm change for individuals, families, and communities facing adversity.





It's official! The Cuenca Soup Kitchen (CSK) is now the Cuenca Foundation (TCF), a United States 501(c)(3) tax exempt charitable organization. This change better reflects our focus on creating long-term change and brighter futures.

TCF is committed to helping people break the cycle of poverty by addressing hunger first, giving people the opportunity to improve their lives. Our food program distributes food kits and a lifeline to brighter futures to approximately 1,000 people, including the beneficiaries of three partner foundations that focus on extremely vulnerable children and the elderly. A social worker evaluates and monitors the vulnerabilities of each beneficiary and manages TCF's extensive waiting list. This embodies our commitment to offering a pathway to stability and hope for the future.

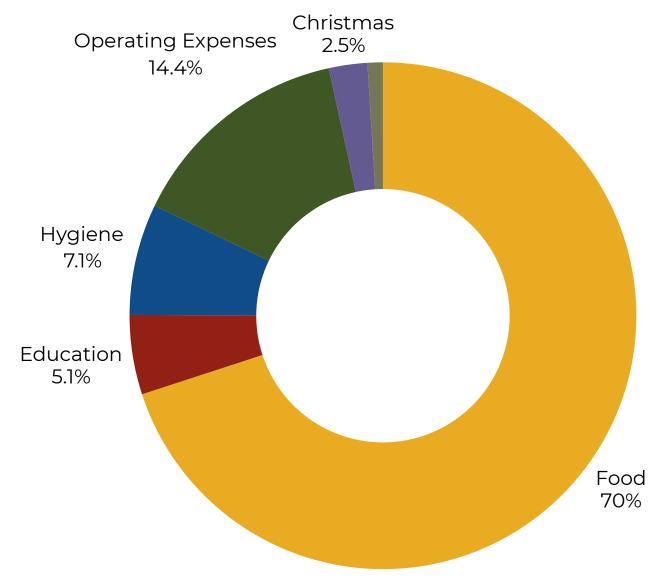

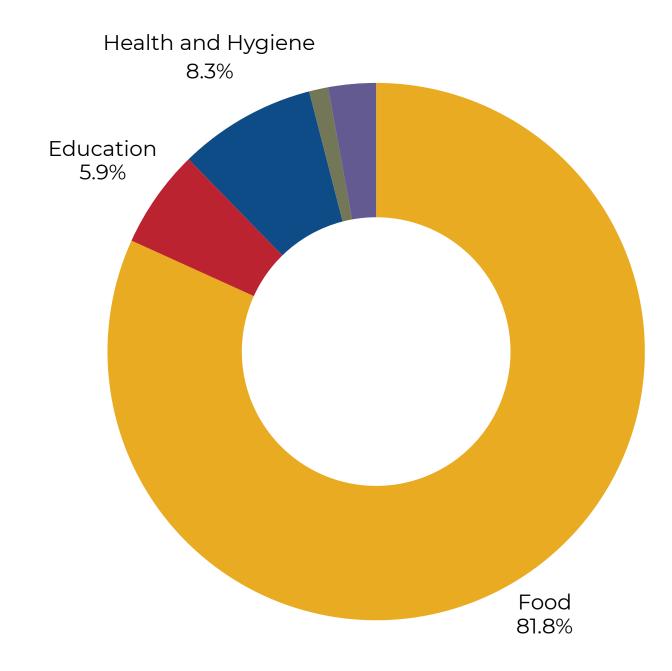

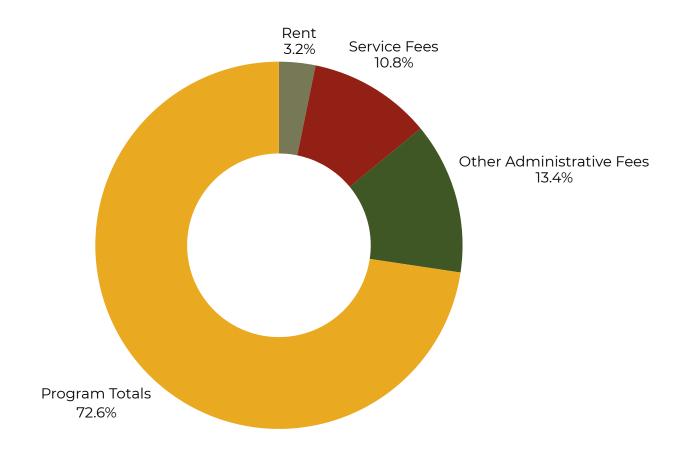

From the beginning, it's been our goal to end food insecurity and fuel bright futures. When we set out on this journey seven years ago, we fed approximately 200 people, five days a week. Today, thanks to incredible community of generous donors and tireless volunteers, the number of people impacted by our food kits at any given time is approximately 1,000.

Since 2018, the Cuenca Foundation (formerly the Cuenca Soup Kitchen) has provided more than 67,500 meals and more than 13,000 food kits. Although it is a huge achievement, our waiting list reminds us how much more there is to be done. There is a clear need to continue the hard work of executing our proven model at a faster and more efficient pace.

This work is far too important to give it anything less than everything we have, and we cannot do it alone. Join us as we move forward with greater impact and create more milestones to celebrate. Together, we can end food insecurity and creating lasting opportunity.
